

Sgt. Maj. John Canley Recieves the Medal Of Honor

President Donald Trump bestowed the Medal of Honor to Marine Ret. Sgt. Maj. John Canley at a White House ceremony on Wednesday, October 17th. Canley was presented the award nearly 50 years after his heroic feat at the infamous battle of Hue City, Vietnam, that cost the lives of hundreds of American service members.

Then-Gunnery Sgt. Canley, was thrust into leading his Alpha company Marines at the beginning of the battle after his company commander was severely wounded. From January 31 to February 6, 1968, Canley led and defended his men from enemy attacks, and exposed himself to deadly machine gun and rocket fire from NVA soldiers who pounded the urban stronghold during the Tet Offensive.

Canley often ran into intense enemy fire to rescue wounded Marines. Twice, the gunny scaled a hospital compound wall in full sight of the enemy to rescue fallen comrades. Canley took care of his Marines, rarely slept during the battle, and single-handedly repelled multiple attacks by charging machine gun positions with law rockets and hand grenades.

During the seven days of intense combat, Canley saved the lives of nearly twenty Marines despite sustaining serious injuries,

For his heroic actions, Canley was originally awarded the Navy Cross, the nation's second highest award for combat valor. Marines who served under Canley during the Hue City firefight pushed for nearly 13 years to upgrade the gunny's award.

"I am accepting this on behalf of all the Marines I had the honor of serving with in Vietnam and who continue to be an inspiration to me every day," Canley said in a press release. "Their bravery and sacrifice is unparalleled."

This Month in Marine Corps History



1 October 1997: The first African-American female colonel in the Marine Corps was promoted to that rank during a ceremony at MCAS Cherry Point, NC. Colonel Gilda A. Jackson, a native of Columbus, Ohio, made Marine Corps history when she achieved the rank of colonel. She was serving as Special Projects Officer, 2d Marine Aircraft Wing at the time of her promotion.

5 October 1775: While meeting in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, the 2d Continental Congress used the word "Marines" on one of the earliest known occasions, when it directed General George Washington to secure two vessels on "Continental risque and pay", and to give orders for the "proper encouragement to the Marines and seamen" to serve on the two armed ships.

6 October 1945: Major General Keller E. Rockey, Commanding General, III Amphibious Corps, accepted the surrender of 50,000 Japanese troops in North China on behalf of the Chinese Nationalist government.

8 October 1899: A force of 375 Marines under command of future Commandant George F. Elliott, attacked and captured the insurgent town of Novaleta, Luzon, Philippine Islands, and linked up with U.S. Army troops. There were 11 Marine casualties.

11 October 1951: A Marine battalion was flown by transport helicopters to a frontline combat position for the first time, when HMR-161 lifted the 3d Battalion, 7th Marines, and its equipment, during Operation Bumblebee, northeast of Yanggu, Korea. Military Operations in Urban Terrain (MOUT) was dedicated at Camp Lejeune, North Carolina, by General Alfred M. Gray, Commandant of the Marine Corps.

19 October 1968: Operation Maui Peak, a combined regimental-sized operation which began on 6 October, ended 11 miles northwest of An Hoa, Vietnam. More than 300 enemy were killed in the 13-day operation. Smith landed at Inchon and began the Inchon-Seoul

campaign.

23 October 1983: At 0622 an explosive-laden truck slammed into the BLT headquarters building in Beirut, Lebanon, where more than 300 men were billeted. The massive explosion collapsed the building in seconds, and took the lives of 241 Americans--including 220 Marines. This was the highest loss of life in a single day for Marines since D-Day on Iwo Jima in 1945.

28 October 1962: An 11,000-man 5th Marine Expeditionary Brigade left Camp Pendleton by sea for the Caribbean during the Cuban Missile Crisis. One week earlier, the entire 189,000-man Marine Corps had been put on alert and elements of the 1st and 2d Marine Divisions were sent to Guantanamo Bay to reinforce the defenders of the U.S. Naval Base. Other 2d Division units and squadrons from five Marine Aircraft Groups were deployed at Key West, Florida, or in Caribbean waters during the Cuban crisis.

31 October 1919: A patrol of Marines and gendarmes, led by Sergeant Herman H. Hanneken, disguised themselves as Cacos and entered the headquarters of the Haitian Caco Leader, Charlemagne Peralte, killing the bandit chief, and dispersing his followers. Sergeant Hanneken and Corporal William R. Button were each awarded the Medal of Honor.

Beirut International Airport Marine Barracks Bombing

Thirty five years ago, on October 23rd, 1983, at 6:22 a.m., a large delivery truck drove to the Beirut International Airport where the Marine Barracks was located. After turning onto an access road leading to the compound, the driver rushed through a barbed-wire fence, passed between two sentry posts, crashed through the gate, and slammed into the lobby of the barracks.

The driver detonated explosives with the power equal to more than 12,000 pounds of TNT. The explosion crumbled the four-story building, crushing 220 Marines, 18 sailors, and 3 soldiers who were stationed there to help keep the peace in a nation torn by war.





It was the bloodiest day in the Corps' history since World War II, when Marines fought to secure Iwo Jima.

(I look back and think that, at the time, I was only 28 and had just gotten married. I had my whole life ahead of me. Sadly, these men never got that chance.)

Rest in peace.


Health Care Enrollment
